# In the Beginning

1969-2019

As far as records show, Lough Gur Development was originally founded in 1969 by Thomas Ryan, Tom Mc Namara and Michael Quinlan. May they rest in peace. Pat Hickey, Johnny Coffey, George Finch and John Hedderman were all actively involved at the early stages and many other community members helped to progress initiatives over 50 years.

At the time of foundation, there was a focus on developing Lough Gur for all visitors and residents without damaging its unique qualities. This ethos remains unchanged.

LGD became a social enterprise in 2011 when the group took over the management of Lough Gur Heritage Centre. The organisation now voluntarily oversees management of the Heritage Centre and the Honey Fitz Theatre with 13 part-time and full-time staff. Considerable change has occurred in the lifetime of LGD.

Projects completed by the founding members and associated committees included setting up of the Lough Gur tour guides, amenity area & heritage centre development and valuable research that has informed future decisions. We thank all who have gone before us for their contribution.

## **LOUGH GUR DEVELOPMENT 2020**

Lough Gur Development is committed to delivering improved services for all visitors and community members. What may seem to be obvious solutions to improve Lough Gur, are not readily acted upon as Lough Gur is in the heart of a residential area and is an environmentally sensitive location.

Lough Gur is in the ownership of Limerick City and County Council and monuments are under the control and care of the the OPW. Therefore as leaseholders of the Heritage Centre only, LGD works within the boundaries of what a voluntary community group can achieve.

Lough Gur amenity area spans over 20 acres. As a community group we are not owners of the Heritage Centre and parkland area but act as advocates to generate support to improve Lough Gur for visitors and community.

To have your say on what you believe are achievable measures to improve the area of Lough Gur join us for a community meeting on February 8th at 11 am in the lakeside Heritage Centre to meet staff members and voice your views.



We are mindful that Lough Gur Heritage Centre, surrounding park and amenity area are owned by Limerick City and County Council and that many of the sites in the area are managed by the OPW. To access the lake front and sites, visitors must pass private rural residential houses, therefore the goal that we are working towards is:

"In association
with the relevant statutory bodies, we strive to
promote, preserve and protect Lough Gur
as an exceptional visitor and community experience".



In 2011 the voluntary committee of Lough Gur Development sought to take over the lease of Lough Gur Heritage Centre from Shannon Heritage who had operated the facility since it was built in 1981. The building is owned by Limerick City & County Council. This request was approved and since 2011 LGD as a not-for-profit community group open the Heritage Centre 12 months of the year to welcome all visitors and community members.

An application for funding to Ballyhoura Development and the J.P Mc Manus Foundation ensured that refurbishment to the building and upgrade of the exhibition was possible. Since opening in 2013 visitor numbers have increased significantly.

In 2020 an options study will be carried out on visitor facilities to identify ways to improve what is on offer in the area without impacting adversely on the local environment and community.

Although tourism can in places generate income, LGD does not prioritise income generating activities over community welfare. Lough Gur is without doubt an area of international significance in terms of archaeology, history and environment. It is also the home place of our local community who value Lough Gur for its extreme beauty, safety and tranquility.

A balanced approach, as operators of a social enterprise, forms the foundation of our work. Visitors, including community members have informed us that they would like to see additional café services and outdoor seating at the Heritage Centre. LGD is actively working with Limerick City and County Council, as the site owners, to deliver improved services.

### **KEY INITIATIVES**

Resources for project work is fundraised for by members of the committee. All members offer their time on a voluntary basis. Since Lough Gur Development was founded in 1969, voluntary members have worked to improve what is on offer. Innumerable projects and initiatives were led voluntarily over 50 years. One such recent initiative included the community alert scheme. Examples of other initiatives include but are not limited to the following:

### 1. RESTORATION OF THE HONEY FITZ THEATRE

Since 1969, the Honey Fitz Theatre has been refurbished four times. Most recently in 2019, meeting room facilities were updated and a disability wc was included. This project was funded by LEADER and match funded by LGD. New seating was put in place, kindly paid for by the Lough Gur Dramatic Society. LGD is grateful for their generous contribution. It is now a comfortable theatre space and is available to book by emailing infoeloughgur.com or phone 061 385186.

### 2. REFURBISHMENT OF LOUGH GUR HERITAGE CENTRE

LGD was instrumental in working to ensure that Lough Gur Heritage Centre was built in 1981 and fully refurbished in 2013. This was achieved by working with Limerick City and County Council as owners of the facility and site. In 2020 we will explore options to improve what is on offer to all visitors.

### 3. SHARED ROADSPACE FROM HOLYCROSS TO LOUGH GUR

In 2019 the road from Holycross to Lough Gur was resurfaced and includes marked sections to signal a shared road space for cyclists, pedestrians and cars. Additional work that can not be readily seen includes extensive repair work to drains, ditches and gullies. The speed limit was also reduced. Funding for the project was secured under the Outdoor Recreation Programme and from Limerick City and County Council who completed the work.

### 4. EVENTS

The Lough Gur Christmas experience has been a sell out event each year. The event is run by local volunteers as a fundraiser for Lough Gur Development. All proceeds are reinvested to improve what is on offer in the area. Additional events include the Lough Gur Fairy Day, Science, Space and Engineering Week events. Parent and toddler and active retired meetings are held throughout the year. Support from volunteers is required to run all events. We welcome your involvement to ensure that events continue throughout the year.

### 5. SOLSTICE PARK PLAYGROUND

The Solstice Park playground, adjacent to Lough Gur Heritage Centre, will open in 2020. The project is funded by Limerick City & County Council, LEADER and the J.P Mc Manus Foundation. Due to adverse weather conditions the ground remains unsuitable for visitors at present. The opening date will depend on improved weather conditions expected in 2020. Updates will be announced on Lough Gur social media pages. Overall the playground will be a welcome addition to the area.

# HONEY FITZ THEATRE

The Honey Fitz Theatre is available for meeting room, hall and performance space rental. Located 2km from the lakefront of Lough Gur, the facility offers a newly refurbished conference area, upgraded and tiered seating along with ample floor space. Lough Gur Development secured funding on four occassions to refurbish the old school house building that was officially opened by JFK's sister Jean Kennedy Smith in recognition of their family connection to the Lough Gur area.

The Honey Fitz Theatre is used for training purposes, including defibrillator training. The next session will run in 2020. To book your place email info@loughgur.com. Activities held in the Honey Fitz include: Dancing (Monday nights), Co Limerick Youth Theatre (Tuesday and Wednesday nights), Art classes with Bobby Ryan (Wednesday morning), Sewing classes (Friday night) and Ballet (Saturday morning). The local rambling house meet on the first Thursday night of each month and all are welcome. The Honey Fitz also serves as home to Lough Gur Drama Society, Lough Gur Historical Society and provides a venue for the Christmas concerts for the local school.

The Honey Fitz Theatre is named after Thomas Fitgerald, great grandfather of JFK. He was called "Honey Fitz" due to his sweet singing voice.



# **SOLSTICE PARK PLAYGROUND**

### Opening in 2020

The majority of visitors to Lough Gur and community members asked for the installation of a playground for many years. Due to the sensitive nature of the site, securing planning permission was an arduous task that took several years. In 2018 planning was secured based on an environmentally sensitive design that embraces educational play as a space inspired play area.

It was hoped that the playground would open in 2019. Due to adverse weather conditions resulting in water logging onsite, a delay was experienced. To reach completion stage we require only fine weather. Once weather improves and the site is deemed safe to access, the park will open. Access to the playgound is via the front entrance gate of Lough Gur Heritage Centre. Updates on the Solstice Park and other projects can be found on the Lough Gur website and social media pages.
